If we cannot find a Leader to run a new group very soon in this u3a branch, the equipment will be passed to another Branch.



U3A Current Affairs Group: A Special Meeting, October 27th 2022



We are a new Group. We aim to be "an open minded, courteous forum where everyone can freely and comprehensively discuss local, national and international issues". We may seek outside expertise, as was the case today.

At our first meeting last month we talked about Waverley's Godalming Regeneration Project, decided there was a distinct lack of information and had the good fortune to be able to have Mark Merryweather, the Waverley councillor who is the Financial Portfolio holder, come to our second meeting today to speak to us.

As there is so much interest the meeting was, we believe for the first time, thrown open to all U3A members.

There was a capacity turnout of 45 people.

This large number brought home to us the impossibility of meeting our goal of a proper discussion for all, with everyone taking a full part. As we are already well subscribed, we have therefore stopped taking on new members. It may well be that our optimum number is as little as for the Book Groups.

Despite the attendance, in today's limited format - Presenter, Audience, Q&As - there was a worthwhile exchange of hard facts, from Mark, constructive views from the attendees and answers from Mark.

Mark started with an overview of the structure of local government, which lead to the services Waverley provides and then a drill down to an analysis of Waverley's spending power, a view of a base line Waverley balance sheet and various scenarios for future, balanced budgets.

We were taken aback by how restrictive the disposal of the council's income is, by the struggle to maintain adequate funding and worse, that Central Government support may shortly be zero and thereafter even reversed: Waverley may well be forced to fund Central Government. Furthermore, there is even less certainty than usual around Central Government's future policy. To cap it all, the situation will deteriorate as the UK's economic position worsens.

Among many fascinating insights we found out that rates are not only mandated by Central Government but that Waverley retains just 5% of the income, so gets all the opprobrium of the tax collector with very little benefit.

With Mark's extensive experience of the imperatives for enterprises around the world it was suggested no commercial organisation would ever accept such a restricted, unstable and in some respects, illogical financial environment.

First up Mark stressed that, appearances perhaps to the contrary, Waverley's current ideas are not definitive. What is happening at present is a consultation: each and every view will be listened to and seriously considered.

The Council Offices in the Burys, built in the 1970s, are now in an advanced state of decrepitude, with a damp, leaking roof, very poor insulation (there was a heartfelt interjection from someone who works there that the offices are far too hot in the summer and freezing in the winter) and there are even asbestos problems. Restoring the offices to an acceptable state will require a considerable sum.

Many options have been considered.

Bearing in mind the dire financial situation, the huge rise in energy costs and the state of and cost of running - the council's offices, Waverley's idea is to use part of Crown Court car park – which they own, and will continue to do so

- to build and own rental housing which will be affordable to essential local workers and with some public parking spaces retained, and
- to build a two storey public car park in the Burys, adjacent to and no higher than the current council building and partially concealed by trees.

Waverley's commitment is that there will be at least as many car parking spaces as before.

The implication was that this approach would

- generate the wherewithall to resuscitate the Council's offices,
- would save not only huge amounts of money on energy etc but
- also provide a significant reduction in carbon emissions and
- would provide Waverley with a long term income stream which would be entirely under their own control.

This latter part of the presentaion was not received with undiluted enthusiasm by the meeting, due perhaps to the perception that we were being presented with a *fait* accompli, despite the speaker's earlier remarks, and the concern that this approach loses the town the visual link from the town to the park, the river and the Lammas Lands beyond.

A lively discussion ensued with many more or less vehement views and alternative ideas put forward.

After the usual two hours, including a break for tea and biscuits, the meeting was closed. Mark stayed on for as long as needed for further discussions with all interested attendees.

We were appreciative of Mark's open, vey well informed and frank approach to what by any measure is a very challenging situation.

We went home with much to reflect on.
