No other single location in the world has contributed so much to aeronautical science over more than a century than Farnborough.

Review of the Talk, 'The Crown Jewels' by Pat Kingshott on 8th September 2023



Fifty members enjoyed our September Talk, The Crown Jewels by Pat Kingshott. This was an appropriate subject because this day was the first anniversary of the death of Queen Elizabeth II.

Pat's knowledge is extensive. She worked and lived with her Beefeater husband in The Tower of London.

Pat's job was to be a member of the team who handle the jewels as they are moved in and out of their storage: for use as they were for the Coronations, and for other State occasions like the Opening of Parliament, for display, for cleaning and for repair. A heavy job physically and a heavy responsibility. Pat told us how aware she was of the flag stone floor beneath her feet and her fear of dropping any of the jewels on to it.

Pat and her husband Alan, showed us a wealth of close up photographs of the crown jewels so that we were able to see the swords, crowns, sceptres, the beautiful solid gold ampulla eagle and spoon, the two maces which represent the authority of Law, and many other gleaming objects in all their detail.

Pat knew every emblem on every object, including its history and how and why it was created. She told us which king initiated the creation of each sword, crown or other creation we saw in the photographs. She knows how many diamonds, pearls, rubies and other precious jewels make up these beautiful objects.

We were told of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert being photographed when the Prince wore the precious, jewel-laden Sword of Offering at a fancy dress party!

After the death of Charles I, the jewels were considered unnecessary and many were sold or melted down. Some of the ancient ones have been recovered, others were remade. King Charles III had some altered for use during his own coronation. A member at the meeting said, 'I'm glad they're kept at The Tower and not at British Museum', referring to the recent reports of thefts from the Museum.

When William and Mary came to the Throne, there was so little money to spare that they had to replace those of Charles I, to have their own emblems mounted on the Sword of State.

Pat told us many stories attached to other articles, like the salts, beautiful table vessels, some shaped like castles, which could only be reached by those at the top tables, so that if one was 'below the salt', one was noted as not being 'out of the top drawer' as we would say today.

Another tale was of the beautiful christening font that holds water from the River Jordan, created for the baptisms of the children of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert. Victoria refused to use the original one because it was used to baptise the eleven illegitimate children of William I.

There was much more of Pat's talk that was fascinating and which you missed if you were not there. The October Talk, **Farnborough Air Sciences Trust**, will be just as interesting.



## **Warning**

## **Visitors to Frensham Great Pond and**



Common are being warned not to enter the water due to the occurrence of bluegreen algae, which was confirmed by

the Environment Agency at its regular assessment.

Signs instructing visitors to avoid contact with the algae and warning people not to enter the water will be up on site until further notice.

Blue-green algae is a natural component of a freshwater ecosystem, but its presence is potentially harmful to humans, animals, birds and fish as well as being very harmful, especially to dogs. Periods of warm weather followed by heavy rain and then further warm, still conditions, cause blue-green algae to appear suddenly. There is no way of removing the algae from the water once it is established. Waverley Borough Council and the Environment Agency recommend that people avoid the algal bloom as it can cause ill health such as dermatitis, eye irritation, rashes, blistering, abdominal pain, diarrhoea and nausea through skin, eye contact or if swallowed. Should anyone believe that they have been affected by blue-green algae, they should seek medical advice or in the case of their pets, veterinary advice.

Waverley Borough Council is monitoring the situation closely and will keep the public informed through its website and social media channels
